Friends. The month of February has brought good news for many of us. That too from our home country of India. No, I am not referring to the half a million doses of Covid19 vaccines that arrived in Canada from India. That of course is a reason to celebrate, especially for those of us who want to see our bilateral ties grow from strength to strength. There is another news that not only brings a level of relief, but also holds the promise of a great future for South Asia.

In the past few weeks, two major developments have been reported on India's Eastern and Western borders. First came the surprise news of disengagement by the armies of India and China from the friction points along the Line of Actual Control. In what could've turned out to be a long and intractable situation has now the potential for a rapprochement with its vast economic benefits for both countries.

Even more surprising was the news from India's Western border where both India and Pakistan have engaged in a hot and cold war for decades. A recent joint declaration at the military level has promised an end to all ceasefire violations along the India Pakistan border. Hopefully, there will be further de-escalation and CBMs in the future. Or as it has happened in the history of the region, this just might be a temporary truce. For the moment, the guns have fallen silent, and that's good news. **(Read more)**

Made in India vaccines arrive in Canada



A consignment of half-a-million doses of the India-made Covishield vaccines arrived in Toronto today, fulfilling an assurance given by Prime Minister Narendra Modi to his Canadian counterpart Prime Minister Trudeau in February. The AstraZeneca vaccines were airlifted to Canada from India on a commercial cargo flight. These vaccines are the first tranche of 2 million vaccines that are to be supplied by May as part of a commercial agreement, facilitated by the two governments, between the Serum Institute of India and Verity Pharmaceuticals of Canada.
